THE SOLUTION OF FRANCIS

Some have asked: what would Francis do or say if he lived today? How would he react to the current ecological crises facing our planet? Look firstly at your attitudes and behaviours.....

Francis was aware of human sinfulness; he had a sense of his own sinfulness and knew well the causes of unhappiness and much of human suffering. Francis understood that the root causes of environmental destruction are to be found in attitudes of avarice, ignorance and pride. He knew that much of human misery came about because of these sins. How often has it not been said that the "evils of globalisation" are due to sheer greed? Or that the "multinationals" see themselves as "buying-off" the resources they need to expand? Or that the "wealth of the First World is built on the poverty of the Third World"? Pride and arrogance go hand in hand; is not that the attitude of those who rape the environment for their own ends?

SOMETHING TO THINK AND PRAY ABOUT THIS WEEK

"Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life." (John 12:24) Jesus' image of the wheat grain symbolises not just our mortal life, but the many times we die a little before our death: with every parting, moving of house or job, loss of a friend or dear one, with any loss of property. My corner

It seems startling that we've hit spring, and September and Fathers' Day all in the one week. How quickly the year is going! This week I visited two families who have each waited for 10 years for the birth of their first child. They talked to me of the painful waiting time, the losses they had experienced, and the ecstatic joy of now having a beautiful, healthy baby to love and cherish. At such times, I tend to think a lot about the mother, and how hard it has been for her. More and more I realize, though, what a hard time it must be for the father—the waiting and the hoping and the disappointment and uncertainty, blame, and a certain sense of helplessness at being unable to do much to help. My son and his wife are expecting their first baby soon, and I have enjoyed watching him build a cupboard, decorate the nursery, choose the right furniture, carefully—and after a great deal of research!—and cope with what has been a rather difficult and demanding pregnancy with good humour and a very generous spirit. I only need to look at him to sense his growing sense of excitement and anticipation. He can hardly wait! So, this week, I pay special tribute to fathers—for their love and care, for hard work and dedication, for trying and failing and trying again; for listening and playing and teaching and sharing; for the example they give, for the tears they shed (or maybe they don't), for the love they give their wives and their children, for the ways they live faithfully; for being doers and dreamers and hoppers and umpires and disciplinarians and fixers and dads. May you all be richly blessed on this Fathers' Day. Special prayers too, today for the friars, who father us all in extraordinary ways.

THE BE MORE CHALLENGE - Food

Today, 930 million people do not have enough to eat. This is not about a shortfall in our capacity to produce food, but about the unequal distribution of the world's wealth. The production and export of food commodities from developing countries frequently involves injustices. Meat production involves methane emissions which are more destructive than CO2 emissions. Excessive processing and packaging of foods, the distance food is transported and the use of refrigeration all contribute to climate change through increasing greenhouse emissions. Food does not reach hundreds of millions of people who need it because food production and distribution are left to unregulated market force. Our challenge to be more is to inform ourselves about the issues and then make a difference. (*101 Facts You Should Know About Food*, Icon Books, 2007).

NEWS FROM THE SCHOOL

As part of our Religious Education Program the students have completed an activity based upon five key values.

These five values are: Respect, Care, Forgiveness, Trust and Fairness. The aim of the activity was to adopt and promote these five key values at our school. Each class was given four photos of animals that represented four of the key values. The values that they represent are: Trust, Respect, Forgiveness and Care. The children were introduced to these photos and asked to explain why they thought the photo represented its chosen word. There was no photo for the value of „Fairness“ as we demonstrate this value when we act out the other four. Each class teacher discussed with their children what each of the four values might look like in our school. The children were then asked to explain: What each value meant? AND

- How do we show Forgiveness?
- How do we show Trust?
- How do we show Care?
- How do we show Respect?

At St Francis Xavier's Primary School. Each class completed this activity and every child was given the opportunity to respond. As a result of this activity, each class submitted their responses and a whole school values booklet was produced. It is hoped that each child adopt these five key values at St Francis Xavier's Primary School and have a better understanding of how to use these values in their daily lives. Each child will receive a copy of this booklet and will have the opportunity to make use of it during their school life. Many thanks to the teachers and students for completing the activity. It's a truly "whole school" activity and one that each member of the community should be very proud of.
